"Extant": In existence today

Earliest Extant Gospel Copies:

Fragment of John 18:31-11 & 37-38 "p⁵²" ("Papyrus 52") ~A.D. 125

Significant portions of all 4 Gospels "p4", "p45", "p64", "p66", "p67", & "p75" Late 2nd century to the early 3rd century A.D.

Many Copies of all 4 Gospels Including Codex Sinaiticus Early 3rd century to the 4th century A.D.

The extant Gospel manuscripts are
closer to their autographs than those of Josephus, Tacitus, Suetonius, Herodotus, and Thucydides.
Casting doubt on the extant Gospel manuscripts would require casting doubt upon our knowledge of almost ALL ancient history and literature
The number of Gospel manuscripts in existence is about
larger than the average number of extant manuscripts of comparable writings.
Text criticism is an, peer-reviewed
discipline that relies on thework of hundreds of scholars.
The many variants in the extant Gospel manuscripts are
the simple product of the incredible of manuscripts we have – which also allows scholars to
more easily variants.



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Earliest Extant Non-Biblical References to the Gospels:

"Against Heresies" by Irenaeus Identifies all 4 Gospels as authoritative, by name Dates all 4 Gospels to the latter half of the first century A.D. A.D. 180

The Muratorian Canon (author unknown)
Identifies 4 Gospels as authoritative, Luke & John by name ~A.D. 170

"Expositions of the Oracles of the Lord" by Papias Identifies Matthew and Mark as authoritative, by name Dates Matthew and Mark to the first century A.D. ~A.D. 130

3 of the 4 Gospels are direct _____ and the 4th is compiled from the eyewitness accounts of others.

The Gospels of Matthew and Luke likely used Mark's Gospel as a source – placing Mark's authorship around the middle of the first century A.D.

Generally-Agreed-Upon Gospel Dating:

Matthew: 65-85 A.D.
Mark: 60-75 A.D.
Luke: 65-95 A.D.
John: 75-100 A.D.
