

## We Go First 2 Thessalonians 2:1-7

V1: Paul wants to talk about	
"I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, there you may be also." - John 14:2-3	
V.2: The lie being spread through the Thessalonian church was that there was no Rapture and they were in the	
Based on Paul's teachings, the Thessalonians had an expectation of a Rapture.	
V.3: "falling away" = "apostasia" in the original Greek	
It's a compound word, consisting of "apo" ("away from") and "histēmi" ("to stand)".	
"apostasia" literally means "to stand away from" or "to depart".	
It is not a technical word (I.E. it does not always mean the same thing).	
It is defined as, "rebellion against God, apostasy, departure, disappearance, distance" (Liddell and Scott) and "revolt, defection, apostasy (from orthodoxy), divorce, departure,	

standing aloof" (Lampe's, "A Patristic Greek Lexicon").

## **REASONS FOR A PHYSICAL DEPARTURE IN V.3:**

1)	There has always been in the Church.	
2)	The definite article before the phrase "falling away".	
3)	The rest of teaches a pre-Tribulation Rapture of the Church.	
4)	The Rapture, not apostasy, is in view in 1 & 2 Thessalonians.	
5)	2 Thessalonians 2 strongly implies the Thessalonian believers were troubled because they did not expect to go through the Day of the Lord.	
6)	Early Bible translations favour a departure.	
7)	The Restrainer of VV.6-7.
